The Zero-Emission Shipping Mission is proud to introduce Australia and the European Commission as the newest members of the Mission. The official announcement was made at the Global Clean Energy Action Forum (GCEAF) in Pittsburgh on 22 September 2022.

By joining the Zero-Emission Shipping Mission, the government of Australia and the European Commission have taken new steps to decarbonize the maritime value chain. This is necessary to achieve progress towards zero-emission shipping. Cross-sector collaboration through an ambitious alliance between countries, the private sector, research institutes and civil society is key to achieving these goals.

The Mission is co-led by Denmark (Ministry of Industry, Business and Financial Affairs, Ministry of Climate, Energy and Utilities and Ministry of Foreign Affairs), Norway (Ministry of Climate and Environment), The United States (U.S. Department of Energy) as well as Global Maritime Forum (representing the Getting to Zero Coalition), and Mærsk Mc-Kinney Møller Center for Zero Carbon Shipping.
